




Setting the Stage


Stark racial gaps in postsecondary attainment persist






More than one-third of U.S. adults changed or canceled their education plans as a result of the COVID-19 crisis







Young adults, Latinos, and Asian Americans are more likely to have had their education disrupted






Fall 2020 enrollment declines hit hardest at schools serving more lower income and people of color

46.8% on average


4.5x Pre-pandemic declines

Disrupted learners shared their experiences

Strada and its research partner, Heart + Mind Strategies, conducted a mixed-methods study:


Key Findings

- Students disrupted by the pandemic recognize that the world into which they've graduated differs
 dramatically from what they expected, and they question whether the education, career, and financing
 options that worked for other students are still relevant today.
- Despite numerous stressors fueling anxiety about the future, students remain committed to postsecondary
 education. They are demonstrating resilience by actively exploring different education and career options
 and setting new goals for themselves.
- Students need open-minded, **personalized college and career guidance** that gives them a window into future career options.
- Removing financial barriers is a core priority for students. The sudden disruption of the pandemic
 contributed to a heightened awareness of the risks associated with accruing debt and led to more loanaverse attitudes.
- Students know that **connecting college and career** will prepare them for an uncertain world of work. They want flexibility and career relevance infused into their educational experience so they can prepare for their intended career while being ready to pivot to other options as needed.





How We Can Act

- Bolster students' capacities to discover their own learning needs and values and promote multiple pathways to postsecondary and career success.
- Invest in near-peer and whole-school models of college advising and develop partnerships especially in the summer transition between high school and college.
- Provide students with greater access to mentors, peers, and people's stories about navigating career paths.



What we heard: Remove financial barriers

How We Can Act

- Increase affordability by making it easier for students to balance learning and work.
- Provide financial coaching and guidance throughout the college journey.
- Offer personalized assistance with scholarship and aid applications from trusted sources.

Integrate career navigation into advising services and coursework.


 Build partnerships with employers and align coursework and curricula with in-demand skills.
